SUBJECT: NOTICE OF PREPARATION OF DRAFT PROGRAMMATIC ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT REPORT AND SCOPING MEETING FOR CLEAN WATER PROGRAM

RECOMMENDATION

That the Public Works Commission receive an update on efforts to initiate the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) process for San Mateo's Clean Water Program; and provide an opportunity for stakeholders to offer input regarding potential environmental impacts of the Program.

BACKGROUND

The City of San Mateo is initiating the Clean Water Program, a series of projects to upgrade and increase the capacity of its wastewater treatment plant (WWTP) and sewer collection system. The Program is intended to reduce the frequency and volume of sanitary sewer overflows (SSOs) that occur during rain events, as well as upgrade WWTP to enable it to meet current and future regulatory requirements.

Two different Clean Water Program alternatives are being considered: a Full Conveyance alternative which would increase the capacity of the sewer pipe system throughout the City and increase pump station capacity to deliver the expected maximum wet weather flows of 98 million gallons per day to the WWTP; and an In-System Storage alternative which would consist of constructing one or more underground in-system storage basins upstream of the WWTP. The alternatives are described in further detail in the Draft Notice of Preparation (Attachment 1). It has been determined that a Programmatic Environmental Impact Report (PEIR) should be prepared pursuant to the California Environmental Quantity Act (CEQA) to analyze the potential environmental consequences of adopting and implementing the Clean Water Program.

A PEIR provides a higher-level evaluation of the potential impacts of a program as a whole and will include a description of the two different program alternatives, identify potentially

significant impacts, and recommend measures to mitigate those impacts. In addition, several projects that are part of the Clean Water Program may be evaluated at a project level of detail. Potential topics that will be addressed by this PEIR include:

The implementation of the Clean Water Program may result in construction-related noise, traffic, and air quality impacts. Odor impacts may result from new treatment or storage facilities. Land use and recreational impacts could result from the siting of new facilities, including storage basins and pump stations. Impacts to biological resources could occur during construction of projects near the San Francisco Bay shoreline. The program may result in improvements to hydrology and water quality. In addition to the potential areas of environmental impacts listed above, the PEIR will evaluate the cumulative impacts and potential growth-inducing impacts at a program level.

A public scoping meeting is being held to solicit public input on the scope and content of the PEIR. While not a legal requirement, conducting a scoping meeting is sound practice as it provides an opportunity for stakeholders to provide comments regarding the type and extent of environmental analysis to be undertaken and discussed in the PEIR. A scoping meeting is for discussion purposes only; it is not a public hearing to determine whether or not the PEIR should be approved and no vote will be taken. The March 11, 2015 meeting of the Public Works Commission will function as the scoping meeting for the Clean Water Program PEIR. This scoping meeting will not be the only opportunity for public input. In order to meet the requirements for CEQA, the draft PEIR will undergo a 45 day public review period (currently planned for October/November 2015), during which time a public hearing will be held. There will also be a public hearing when the Commission considers the final PEIR for certification.

SUMMARY/NEXT STEPS

At this time staff is seeking stakeholder comments on the scope of the PEIR. Feedback will be considered during the preparation of the PEIR. Preparation of the Administrative Draft PEIR will commence at the conclusion of the scoping period.

BUDGET IMPACT

Development of the PEIR is funded through the Program Management Project #469981. It is not anticipated that future adoption of the PEIR will initiate any projects that will have an impact on the General Fund. Future implementation of the Program will be done through separate projects which will be funded by the Sewer Enterprise.

ENVIRONMENTAL DETERMINATION

The City is responsible for preparation of all environmental documents for the Clean Water Program. This will include preparation of a PEIR for the Clean Water Program under the provisions of CEQA.

NOTICE PROVIDED:

Public notice of the scoping meeting was published in the San Francisco Examiner Peninsula Edition and the San Mateo Daily Journal on March 4, 2015. A copy of the Notice of Preparation was provided through the distribution of notices via certified mail, sent February 27, 2015 to all CEQA required agencies and partner agencies. A copy of this staff report was distributed on March 4, 2015 via email to internal stakeholders and partners, as well as other interested parties who have expressed an interest in remaining informed regarding the Clean Water Program CEQA process (listed in Attachment 2). Notices of the scoping meeting were also posted at City Hall and at the San Mateo Main Library.



Project Location and Boundaries

The City of San Mateo (City) is located in San Mateo County along the San Francisco Bay coast of the San Francisco Peninsula, approximately 20 miles south of downtown San Francisco and approximately 30 miles northwest of San José. The City of San Mateo collects, conveys, and treats wastewater for the citizens of San Mateo as well as serving the surrounding communities, including: a portion of the County of San Mateo, the Town of Hillsborough (Hillsborough), Crystal Springs County Sanitation District (CSCSD), and Foster City/Estero Municipal Improvement District (EMID). These areas are shown on Figure 1. The City of San Mateo wastewater treatment plant is located on the northeast edge of the City adjacent to San Francisco Bay (Figure 1).

Description of Project

The City of San Mateo is initiating the Clean Water Program, a series of projects to upgrade and increase the capacity of its wastewater treatment plant and sewer system. The Clean Water Program will address sanitary sewer overflows (SSOs) that occur during rain events. In 2009, the City, CSCSD, and Hillsborough were issued a Cease and Desist Order (CDO) (R2-2009-0020) due to violations in discharge prohibitions from SSO discharges. The CDO requires that the frequency and volume of SSOs be consistently and substantially reduced. In addition, the Clean Water Program will upgrade the wastewater treatment plant (WWTP) to enable it to meet current and future regulatory requirements such as nutrient loading and elimination of blending. The City is considering two different Clean Water Program alternatives, as described below.

Clean Water Program with Full Conveyance

This program would increase the capacity of the sewer pipe system throughout the City and increase pump station capacity to deliver the expected maximum wet weather flows of 98 million gallons per day to the WWTP. This flow rate is greater than the treatment capacity of the WWTP and the amount that is permitted for discharge to the Bay through the WWTP's outfall. An underground flow equalization storage basin would be constructed at or adjacent to the WWTP to hold wastewater when it is arriving too rapidly. The wastewater would be stored until flows through the WWTP were low enough to treat it and discharge it. An expanded or new Dale Avenue Pump Station would be required. Larger treatment facilities at the WWTP are also required to handle this additional projected flow.

The equalization storage basin and some of the new or expanded treatment facilities may be located on the adjacent City-owned Detroit Drive site, as shown in Figure 2. The City may also consider using the City-owned undeveloped parcel just southwest of the WWTP fence line and acquiring the privately owned parcels located just northeast of the WWTP, as shown in Figure 2, for treatment or storage facilities.

Clean Water Program with In-System Storage

This program would consist of constructing one or more underground in-system storage basins upstream of the WWTP. These basins would store a portion of the wet weather flows in the collection system. This program would reduce the needed capacity and size of pipelines and pump stations downstream of the storage basin; it would also reduce the required size of WWTP treatment facilities. This program would include an equalization storage basin at or adjacent to the WWTP, though much smaller than the equalization basin for the Full Conveyance program.

One or more locations may be considered for the in-system storage. Locations could include City-owned properties, school district-owned properties, undeveloped properties, or other feasible sites.

New or expanded treatment facilities may be located on the adjacent City-owned Detroit Drive site, as shown in Figure 2. The City may also consider using the City-owned undeveloped parcel just southwest of the WWTP fenceline and acquiring the privately owned parcels located just northeast of the WWTP, as shown in Figure 2, for treatment or storage facilities.

The PEIR will include a description of both program alternatives, identify potentially significant impacts, and recommend measures to mitigate those impacts. 


